Helmets and High School Sailing

Helmets???

What's up with that? The Americas Cup crews are wearing helmets. Now the question is "should we be wearing them too?" ?" A lot of discussion has been occurring around the use of helmets for

sailing. Several of the High School Sailing Team coaches attended a coaching clinic in Seattle this past weekend in which the helmet issue was brought up. The following is an excerpt from a handout at that clinic:

Common sense would suggest that helmets reduce the risk of concussion, and helmets are certainly encouraged by some specialists. However there is conflicting evidence about helmet effectiveness for moderate to heavy head bumps. Helmets protect against outer skull and scalp injuries and minor bumps, but do little to protect the brain from bouncing around inside the skull in a more forceful knock. Most of the research is focused on the sports like football, boxing, or soccer and although helmet technology improvement is underway, most of the effort is towards modifying athlete behaviors to avoid head hits. Concern is also voiced about a false sense of safety while using a helmet leading to heavier head hits, or greater risk taking among youth. There is a bit of a learning curve for experienced sailors new to a helmet and sailors who have used helmets have mentioned needing to learn to duck slightly lower to avoid the boom hitting the helmet during routine tacks, and occasional lines hanging up on the lower edge of a helmet.

It appears there is no definitive answer. The experts are unable to agree if wearing helmets makes our sport safer or if it causes more risk. So what are we going to do? As high school coaches we are not going to make any recommendations. We are going to share as much information about helmets as we have with parents and youth sailors and let them make an informed decision. So why do the Americas Cup racers wear helmets? It may have something to do with expected speeds over 40 knots and the potential of falling forty feet from the hull of a capsized boat. —*Joe Novello*

I'm about to head to SoCal to attend a two week intensive exam-preparation class as the final step to regaining my lapsed Captain's license, regretfully missing the February meeting and Wine and Seafood fest. Regaining that credential will allow me to take passengers for hire and legally teach sailing on an auxiliary powered sailboat. Though I have done this same Captain's class before, it was over 10 years ago and I admit the material isn't as fresh in my mind as it needs to be. I also just returned from a one day seminar on Race Management held at the Vancouver Lake Sailing Club and taught by Bill Gage, the Area Race Manager for Northern Cal. The Race Management seminar was very informative, and though some of the material was geared for larger clubs racing larger fleets, it is my feeling that it would be good for us to adopt a more correct way of running our races to prepare us for hosting future regattas or to help those members who may plan to race in other venues. The whole reason we might want to slightly modify the way we do things is to try to achieve a higher level of Safety and Fairness to all racers, which in turn adds much to the Fun Factor. If we don't like the changes after giving them a chance, we can always go back to our old ways, or try something else.

I'm sure the Commodore has written about the upcoming construction project, and again, I hope we can all get behind it and share the belief that it will be a great addition to our club and end up paying for itself just as the existing building has done. High School/Youth Sailing Update



It is time to start up the high school sailing program. There will be an athlete/parent meeting on February 15th at 5pm in the clubhouse. We are going to step up the program to create an exciting and competitive season this year.
