Beginning Tuesday, May 27th and continuing through labor day the Oregon Boating Foundation Float House will be open for junior Yaquina Bay Yacht Club members to check out boats for recreational use. Adult club members will check out JY Trainer and El Toro sailboats for youth to sail around the marina and in the bay in front of the Embarcadero Condominium Complex. A chase boat will be manned to ensure a safe afternoon sail for all participants. The program is open to any club members but is mainly focused on kids.

The float house will be open from 4:00 - 7:00 pm. Youth under 12 years old should be accompanied by a parent as the adults running the program will not be responsible for supervising children.

Youth attending this program should bring their own personal safety items including wet suit, life jacket, water shoes or booties, hat, sun screen, water, and towel.

HOSPICE REGATTA NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS IN ST. PETERSBURG, FLORIDA

It was lovely weather in St Petersburg with highs in the upper 70s to lower 80s every day we were there. Seventeen teams from around the US and Canada came to compete during the April 11-13 Regatta. The only two teams from the west coast qualified at our hospice regatta last October. Gordon Mattatall from Eugene qualified as our regatta champion, having won in the largest fleet. I qualified as a Hospice Impact skipper for raising the most funds of any single boat and for helping to make the first ever hospice regatta in Oregon a reality. I recruited two others from our Hospice Regatta organizing committee Giovanni Catalano and Mac MacConnel, as well as one



of our alternate Champion skippers Terry Lettenmair what had won the 420 division at our regatta.

The St. Petersburg Yacht Club was the host for the regatta and I must say that their facilities are quite impressive. They have several large meeting rooms, a restaurant, a bar, a men's and ladie's card room, and an outdoor pool and deck. They host many regattas throughout the year and their showcases full of trophies is impressive as are the photos and stories posted throughout the club. I exchanged burgees with the Commodore and invited their club members to come visit us on the west coast. Needless to say we were treated well during the regatta and the hospitality at the clubhouse was outstanding. Upon request Giovanni and Mac even got our gracious hosts to retap the keg for them after the festivities died down. We were getting ready to leave but being the two fisted drinkers that they are they were each able to fill two cups of beer for the road. I was the designated driver that night.

The Championship Regatta format was simple. Divide the teams up into two groups, have each group race in one of the two types of one design boats each day and then split the teams into a Championship and a Commodore fleet for the final day of racing based on their record. All races count toward the final results for each fleet.

The two one design boats were Sonars, a Bruce Kirby designed 23 foot sloop <u>http://www.sonar.org/</u>, and Ideal 18s made by Schumway Marine <u>http://shumwaymarine.com/ideal18/</u>. The Sonars were sailed with a 4 person crew and the Ideal 18s with a 3 person crew. That meant that one crew member got to watch from the spectator boat when not sailing, which was not a terrible duty.

The predominant weather pattern was for easterly winds during the regatta. Unfortunately for the sailors that meant that as the day warmed up ashore, the easterly wind died down to nothing by mid-day as the sea breeze tried its best to come in off the Gulf of Mexico into Tampa Bay. Usually it didn't make it, or if it did it wasn't until about 5:30 or 6 PM long after sailing for the day was over and the social events were about to start. With the east wind in the morning and the tide coming in to Tampa Bay, we had choppy seas which were particularly tough to deal with in the Ideal 18s as the wind got lighter.

Many of the teams had competed in the Hospice Championships before, so they may have been a bit more familiar with the boats and the venue than we were. At any rate when it came time to split the fleet, our team with its two past Commodores ended up in the Commodore's Division. We were in third place in that fleet going into the last day, with Gordon Mattatall in first place a few points ahead. In the three races sailed that morning we managed to get a 3rd and two bullets to win the Commodore's Division with Gordon taking 2nd.

It was a great event and fun to meet and sail with people from all over the country. Next year you too could be the one nominated to participate in the Championships. It's a great opportunity and one you will want to take advantage of if you get the chance.
