2021 High School Sailing Season Going Full Swing By Laurie Weitkamp

A small but enthusiastic band of student athletes have been testing their sailing skills on Monday and Wednesday afternoons this spring for the Newport High School sailing team. While several of the students sailed in 2019 and 2020 (Hunter Stewart, Chloe Burke, Sara Rash), several others (Everett Johnson, Sheala Hubbard) are new to the team and new to sailing and/or sailboat racing. With last year's season being extremely short, this year is a building year as we work to increase sailing skills before focusing on racing.

Partially for Covid restrictions and partially because of the small number of participants, the students have been sailing in OBF's Optimist single-handed prams, which were moved from OBF's Toledo facility to the Floathouse in Newport in early March. Sailing the Optis—or any single-handed boat, for that matter--is great for increasing sailing skills, because the craft's sole occupant has to do everything: steer, trim the sails, balance the boat, as well as know the rules of the road. For sailors who have mainly crewed in the past, its been a great opportunity to learn to skipper and figure out how to make the boats go forward, especially up wind. For our new sailors, they've been learning to sail by leaps and bounds. It also turns out the Opits are quite stable in relatively high winds, which has been fortunate since its been fairly breezy during most practices.

Despite the small turnout and sailing funny-looking Optis back and forth between buoys in front of the Embarcadero, the level of enthusiasm on the team has been fantastic! After two hours on the water at a recent practice, the kids were all smiles while putting away the boats and clearly had fun out on the water (the warm sunshine didn't hurt, either). Seen from the coaches' angle, it is impressive how quickly our sailors are improving their skills and become proficient sailors, and obviously enjoying it.

The annual Oregon Cup, held between the three Oregon sailing teams (Portland, Hood River, and Newport) will be held on May 1st in Portland. We hope to have at least a few Newport sailors participate in the regatta. By the next newsletter, the high school season will be over but we hope our youthful sailors will continue to sail on Yaquina Bay on Wednesday nights. Keep an eye out for them!

Who Wants to go for a Boat Ride?


It's been a long process, but after several years of owning and upgrading the "free boat" that was given to me by a gentleman I still have never met, (and ultimately investing more \$\$ than she is worth), the *Mahalo* is finally ready for an educational ocean voyage. The plan is to run her up to Astoria in an overnight dash, cross the Columbia Bar, and put her into a marina either in Ilwaco or Astoria proper depending on the timing. Participants will practice navigation, night sailing, watch standing, operating boat systems, and experiencing what a long boring boat ride is like, most likely under power the whole way, along with possibly having some fun! The experience will be equivalent to an ASA 103, 104, and 105 class all rolled into one, with the possible exception of anchoring practice unless time allows. It will require some experience and a minimum of Basic Keelboat class as a prerequisite, along with the proper clothing and gear, including an inflatable lifejacket with built in harness or a separate harness, and tether, since everyone will be harnessed at all times when on deck. Tentative cost will be \$250 per student, which will include provisions and a ride back to Newport. Contact education@yaquinabayyachtclub.org if interested in more details.

Checking Out of the Marguesas 05/26/07

So we had a slight change of plans, and the crew flew out of Nuku Hive instead of continuing on to Papeete, where they had to be by the 31st. They were replaced by Admiral Ladysailor herself, who flew in May 15. It was a happy change for Arabella, because finally we are back to the two of us who know, understand, and love her, and we share the same attitudes about life and cruising. Also the time constraint is removed- no more deadlines to meet or hurrys to be in. I understand some people are bound by their "real life" but this is my real life, and I like to enjoy every minute of it. Now we can relax and experience this beautiful place at a cruiser's pace. Bottom line is, this should have been "plan A".



We did a little anchorage-hopping around Nuku Hiva to get Barb's sea legs working, kicked back and got some business taken care of (taxes, and bills, uggggg) but thanks to the great wifi hotspot in Taohae Bay, we could do it all from the comfort of the boat. Changed oil and filters, topped off fuel and water, loaded provisions and set off for Manihi, our first stop in the Tuamotu Group, on 5/24. Right now we're about halfway there, sailing along in bright sunshine, and all is good. One thing I discovered, though, was a sneaking suspicion of mine was correct. I was talking with Maotai at the Yacht Services branch there at Nuku Hiva, and noticed he collected lots of used oil from yachts, and he mentioned, "we take it to the station and they just dump it into the tank". I had been hoping it was the used oil tank, but no, my fears were proven justified when I changed a fuel filter enroute. There, in the dim light of the engine room, I saw what had made the 120 liters of fuel smell like burnt old crankcase oil. It was recycling, Nuku Hiva style. Engine seems to run fine on it, just hope my filter supply doesn't run low.



5/28 (continuing) So here we are pleasantly, though literally, stuck in the lagoon at the Tuamotu island of Manihi, wrapped up tight on some coral heads 65' below, invisible to us. At first we thought we'd made a poor choice of location for the anchor, (probably did) but I wouldn't be surprised if 90+% of those who drop the hook anywhere around here experience the same fate. At least we don't have to worry about dragging into that major coral island-type deal right behind us...

Entering the pass (bottom of the pic) into this hollow island (Atoll) caused us a bit of trepidation, I don't mind admitting, since it was "our first", but luckily our timing was good and fears were unfounded. We slid right in towards the end of the afternoon flood, and then the fun began,

since the C-map electronic chart had no details for this particular atoll, and the cruising guides were less than complete in their information. So we just kind of winged it and eventually found the marked channel that goes around inside the whole circumference of the atoll.

Anyhow, it's beautiful here, the locals are extremely kind and generous people, and it's so nice to be on an unrocking-boat after the little (4.5 day) passage from the Marquesas. Maybe the 23 days of rocking and rolling on the crossing just put me off it or something, I don't know...

We've been promised a diver, but he hasn't made it the last two days, so we may be looking to ask the Pearl Hotel dive shop guys for help. Have a feeling it may be a crummy job nobody wants to do, working blind down 65 feet wrestling anchor chain off coral heads. Maybe there's a big business salvaging anchors and chain- who knows. Meanwhile we won't mind being here a week or two and figuring it out. ~Mike Fulmor
