The 2019 High School Sailing Season has started!

The 2019 Newport High School sailing team is up and running! Head Coach Greg Krutzikowsky kicked off the season on the last day of January with a pizza lunch at Newport High School. Greg reports the lunch was well attended with over a dozen potential sailors. While the team lost several of its more experienced sailors to graduation last spring, returning underclass sailors were in attendance at the lunch, along with many new faces. Unlike prior years when boys have dominated the sailing team, this year's group of sailors is largely female and many come from the swim team, meaning they're extremely comfortable on the water and also very competitive.

A parent-athlete meeting is scheduled for February 11 at YBYC, when the coaches will explain the nuts and bolts of the sailing team, which is a regular High School sport. This year's coaching staff includes Greg, Terry Lettenmaier, Laurie Weitkamp, and Ron Yanichek. Practices start on February 20th, and will occur on Mondays and Wednesdays, from 4 to 6 or 7 pm (daylight and weather permitting). The team practices in YBYC's fleet of 420 dinghies, which is a popular high school and collegiate sailing dinghy around the Northwest and across the country. If you want to see some fun and fast sailing on the bay, we normally practice in front of the Embarcadero, so there are plenty of great viewing opportunities from shore.

We have a full schedule of regatta planned for the team, starting on March 3 with a one day regatta in Portland, running through May 18 with the Oregon Cup, also in Portland. In between are regattas in Newport (March 16), Hood River (April 16), with districts in Anacortes, WA (May 4-5), and a possible very long trip to the Island Cup on Lopez Island (April 13-14).

It takes many hands to stage a great regatta and we can use your help with our home regatta on March 16, when we expect as many as 50 High School sailors from Washington and Oregon in attendance. The list of volunteer opportunities is long and includes helping with race committee, helping on crash boats, walking sailors from YBYC to the dock & back,

scoring races, buying food, serving lunch, and setting up and cleaning up, to name a few of the jobs. If you're willing to help for a few hours or all day, please contact Greg K.; we can't pull this regatta off without your help!
